
Introduction

We know people are worried about the Cost of Living and so the Government is providing <u>Help for Households</u>.

As part of Help for Households support, around 6 million disabled people in the UK will receive a one-off £150 Disability Cost of Living Payment, with the majority being paid by early October.

This toolkit contains everything you need to communicate the Disability Cost of Living Payment, with some details on the wider Help for Households support too, including:

- What the different payments are
- When payments will be paid
- Eligibility for payments
- How you can support customers.



Disability Cost of Living Payment - at a glance

People in receipt of qualifying disability benefits will be entitled to a one-off payment of £150 £150 disability cost of living payments from the 20 September and if you are eligible, you will be paid over the next few weeks 6 million people who are paid certain disability benefits will benefit, equivalent to nearly one in ten of the UK population

Automatic payment which is part of the wider package of support for the rising cost of living. You do not need to contact us. People in receipt of qualifying disability benefits will be entitled to a one-off payment of £150, known as the Disability Cost of Living Payment. To be eligible for this payment, a person must have received a payment (or later received a payment) of one of the following qualifying benefits in respect of 25 May 2022:

- Attendance Allowance
- Constant Attendance Allowance
- Disability Living Allowance for adults
- Disability Living Allowance for children
- Personal Independence Payment
- Adult Disability Payment (in Scotland)
- Child Disability Payment (in Scotland)
- Armed Forces Independence Payment
- War Pension Mobility Supplement.

Recipients will not need to apply, and payments will be issued automatically from 20 September 2022, with most payments made by early October. The process will take a little longer where people are awaiting a decision on their eligibility for a disability benefit, but payment will still be automatic.

Six million disabled people in the UK will receive their one-off £150 Disability Cost of Living Payment from 20 September 2022, to help with the rising cost of living.

Those being paid a qualifying disability benefit will be paid automatically by their usual payment method from 20 September 2022, with most payments being made over the next few weeks.

For anyone currently awaiting a decision on a disability benefit claim who subsequently receives an award, the Disability Cost of Living Payment will be made automatically as long the qualifying benefit covers 25 May 2022.

For disabled people on low-incomes, this payment comes on top of means-tested Cost of Living payments, £400 for all households to help with energy bills, and an extra £150 for properties in Council Tax bands A to D in England.

Q. How do people apply for the Disability Cost of Living Payment?

A. People do not need to apply for the Disability Cost of Living Payment. If they are eligible, they will be paid automatically in the same way they usually receive their benefit. If people receive a message asking them to apply or contact someone about the payment, this might be a scam.

Q. Will these payments affect other benefits?

A. These payments are not taxable and will not affect the benefits or tax credits people already receive.

Q. How will people know they are eligible? What are the qualifying dates and requirements?

A. To receive the Disability Cost of Living Payment of £150, people must have been entitled to a payment (or later found to be entitled to a payment) of one of the following qualifying benefits for 25 May 2022: Attendance Allowance, Constant Attendance Allowance, Disability Living Allowance for adults, Disability Living Allowance for children, Personal Independence Payment, Adult Disability Payment (in Scotland), Child Disability Payment (in Scotland), Armed Forces Independence Payment and War Pension Mobility Supplement.

Q. If someone receives the Disability Cost of Living Payment, are they still entitled to the meanstested Cost of Living Payment?

A. Yes. This payment comes on top of means-tested Cost of Living payments.

Q. What if a customer has applied for a disability benefit but has not yet been assessed. Will they still receive a Disability Cost of Living Payment?

A. If someone currently awaiting a decision on their disability benefit claim and subsequently receives an award, the Disability Cost of Living Payment will be made automatically in due course as long the qualifying benefit was in payment for 25 May.
